

"In The Interest of Justice", Cont'd from 27th August 2012 -- Pg. 17:

Mr. Cory Hart, was, the individual of whom the prosecutor and its LAPD detective Leroy Orozco secured to fabricate the maliciously prosecuted murder complaints was subsequently arrested and confined, in the Los Angeles County Central jail, for the possession and sales of cocaine drugs. Mr. Hart had no knowledge about detective Helvin's portended retirement or the career change.

During the course of the jail interview, detective Helvin gathered exonerating defense evidence; Hart confessed that: ". . . he had killed a drug dealer for Larry Turner and that Larry would not have trusted any other person to kill for him or to conduct other illegal activities. 'That he personally did not care about my non-involvement in the murders of Larry Turner or Roger Grant ¶ ¶ ¶ ¶ ¶ That he would say whatever necessary to help them (LAPD) convict me 'Because I had killed (not Larry Turner or Roger Grant) his [PIRU] homeboy, Attwon Thomas.' "

Private Investigators (PI's), Helvin and Feinburg also discovered relevant evidence and the material witnesses who had either been shunned or overlooked by the primary LAPD robbery-homicide detectives, Leroy Orozco and Paul Tippin.

Mr. Freddie Jones, a crime scene witness, lived in the home directly across the street from the home (owned by Larry Turner) whereby he had first heard gun-shots before then observing the actual killer running away from the crime scene, enter a large vehicle and driving away with great haste; around the fixed time (2:30 -- 3:00 p.m.) of Larry's death.

Ms. Evelyn Hassell, also a shunned crime scene witness, lived in the vicinity whereat Roger Grant was murdered. Ms. Hassell had observed three Black men seated in an older vehicle parked in front of her Fountana, California home. The men was observed arguing in that she had observed blood running down the side of one of the three men's faces.

Both crime scene witnesses excluded me and/or my codefendant as the persons that either had observed, at the two separate locations.

The revelations generated bitter acrimony between Mr. Helvin's and Mr. Feinburg's former (LAPD) employer. Despite maintaining stellar police records throughout their law enforcement careers serving and protecting the citizens of the City and County of Los Angeles, California, and earning Honorable retirements; their spirited investigation made them instant villains
