Subject: Mold/mildew and infectious diseases.
in P-Dorm Housing

Here in P-Dorm, death row housing, our lives, health and safety is being put at risk due to mold/mildew, that's in the showers, ventilation system, and on the food trays that are being sent back here from the kitchen. An inspection of the showers, vents and under neath the trays by a certified mold inspector will confirm the detection of mold in these listed areas.

Further more the living areas, cells and wings are infested with "mosquito's" that can carry the West Nile, Chick-V, Hepatitis C and other deadly viruses, infecting, not only the inmates, who live, and or have to work back here, but also staff, and volunteers, who work back here in this environment. Most of these mosquito's

are entering through the rear doors that open into a back stair case, that's designed for out door recreational use. Doors having inch or more gaps beneath them, and screens that have holes in them, or gaps on the side, where they no longer fit securely.

The wings, and living areas, also lack a temperature controlled environment. Where the temperatures in the cells, are 90 and 100 degrees in the summer months, combined with 80 to 100% humidity. Which becomes the perfect breeding ground for mold, bacteria and other infectious diseases, that endanger the lives of inmates, staff and volunteers, who are exposed to the mold, mildew, bacteria and other infectious diseases.

This high humidity, and temperatures, are the conditions that scientist use, in laboratory settings to grow mold/mildew, bacteria and other viruses.

With this setting, comes dampness on the floors, walls, in the ventilation system, as well as, men who have damp clothing, from exercising, sitting around in laundry bags, for 2, 3, 4 days breeding mold bacteria and viruses in this environment.

Clearly, this is a dangerous environment, that endangers the health, and safety of inmates, staff and volunteers who are back here. Therefore a temperature controlled environment is needed.
