

FLOODED MINDS

I doubt many doors have flung open to house the displaced. QUESTION: Why believe WANT can overpower global warming, a.k.a. Climate Change?

TO PONDER: We are NOT the masters of our domain, not completely.

The Federal Government has—for decades—given financial aid to South Carolina (just as it has in other states) for many things.
