'Sully' soars over 'Blair Witch,' 'Bridget' at box office

LOS ANGELES — *Blair Witch*, *Bridget Jones's Baby* and *Snowden* didn't ground *Sully* at the weekend box office.

The dramatization of the Miracle on the Hudson directed by Clint Eastwood and starring Tom Hanks as Captain Chesley "Sully" Sullenberger remained at No. 1 for the second week with \$22 million.

A trio of newcomers failed to fly close to the haul earned by *Sully*.

The horror revival *Blair Witch* nabbed \$9.7 million at No. 2, while the comedy *Bridget Jones's Baby* starring Renee Zellweger as the titular character crawled away with \$8.2 million.

Snowden, which features Joseph Gordon-Levitt portraying NSA whistleblower Edward Snowden, opened at No. 4 with \$8 million. The debut marks the lowest in filmmaker Oliver Stone's career.

Angelina Jolie files for divorce from Brad Pitt

Angelina Jolie has filed for divorce from Brad Pitt, USA TODAY has confirmed. The couple married in 2014 and has been together since 2004.

"This decision was made for the health of the family," Robert Offer, an attorney for Jolie

tells USA TODAY in a statement. "She will not be commenting at this time, and asks that the family be given their privacy during this difficult time."

Jolie, 41, and Pitt, 52, have six children together: Maddox, 15, and Pax, 12, Zahara, 11, and Vivienne, 8, Shiloh, 10 and Knox, 8. According to *People* and *TMZ*, in court documents the date of separation is listed as Sept. 15, and Jolie has asked for physical custody of all six children.

Pitt soon released his own statement. "I am very saddened by this, but what matters most now is the well-being of our kids," he told *People*. "I kindly ask the press to give them the space they deserve during this challenging time."

For 12 years the couple has captivated international audiences with their jet-setting glamour, their commitment to philanthropy, and their stunning red carpet turns. But they put off getting legally married for a decade, until announcing a surprise ceremony in France at Château Miraval in August 2014. In December 2014 Jolie told *Vanity Fair* being married did feel different for the couple. "It feels nice to be husband and wife," she said.

Their children helped them write the vows for their ceremony, she revealed, adding, "they did not expect us never to fight, but they made us promise to always say, 'Sorry,' if we do. So they said, 'Do you?,' and we said, 'We do!'"

Jolie was previously married to actors Jonny Lee Miller (1996-1999) and Billy Bob Thornton (2000-2003). Pitt was previously married to Jennifer Aniston from 2000 to 2005, and the two announced their separation just before the release of *Mr. and Mrs. Smith*, which starred Pitt and Jolie as husband-and-wife spies.

Though Pitt and Jolie denied infidelity, Pitt later told *Rolling Stone* he "fell in love" making the movie. A month after the film's release, the first paparazzi pictures of Pitt and Jolie surfaced.

Pitt later became a legal parent to Jolie's two adopted children, Maddox and Zahara, and Jolie gave birth to their first child, Shiloh, in May 2006. Their son Pax was adopted in 2007 from Vietnam, and Jolie gave birth to their twins, Knox and Vivienne, in 2008.

In October 2014, Pitt told USA TODAY family helped him shake off long days working on the war film *Fury*. To decompress, "I'd go hug my kids," he said. In May 2013 Jolie went public with health issues, revealing that she had decided to undergo a preventative double mastectomy thanks to a blood test that had "revealed that I carried a mutation in the BRCA1 gene," she told the *New York Times*, giving her "an estimated 87 percent risk of breast cancer and a 50 percent risk of ovarian cancer."

Jolie's mother, actress Marcheline Bertrand, died in 2007 at 56 after an eight-year battle with ovarian cancer.

The day Jolie released her essay, USA TODAY sat down with Pitt and he brought his hand to his heart, recalling "an emotional and beautifully inspiring few months. And I'll tell you, it's such a wonderful relief to come through this and not have a spectre hanging over our heads."

He called Jolie his "hero," saying "she's still here."

In March 2015 Jolie went public again in an essay revealing she had her ovaries and fallopian tubes removed and had gone through early menopause.

Later that year, promoting their film *By the Sea* (which was panned by critics), Pitt told the *Today* show that "there was no vanity to my wife's approach to protecting her health. It was mature. 'This is our life and we're gonna make the best of it.' There was a strength in that. It was just another one of those things in life that makes you tighter, and she was doing it for the kids, and she was doing it for her family so we could be together."

Jolie added: "I knew through the surgeries that he was on my side and that this wasn't something where I was gonna feel less of a woman because my husband wasn't gonna let that happen. To face these issues together and speak about them and talk about what it is to be human, I think can be a beautiful thing." But their professional interests had recently seemed to be diverging.

Jolie, a special envoy for the UN, this year became a visiting professor at the London School of Economics, and has worked to shine a spotlight on the worldwide refugee crisis for years. On Sept. 8 she made a surprise appearance at a major UN peacekeeping summit, blasting the peacekeeping organization for incidents of sexual assault, saying cases of women and children being sexually exploited by those in charge of protecting them were "intolerable." Her interest in acting, however, seemed to be waning. "I've never been comfortable as an actor; I've never loved being in front of the camera," she told *DuJour* magazine in 2014. Though Disney announced *Maleficent 2*, starring Jolie, is in the works, the film has yet to go into production.

Jolie has maintained her interest behind the lens, first directing 2011's *In the Land of Blood and Honey*, followed by 2014's *Unbroken*, and 2015's *By the Sea*. She recently finished directing the Netflix film, *First They Killed My Father: A Daughter of Cambodia*, based on the memoir by author and human rights activist Loung Ung about the brutal Khmer Rouge regime of the 1970s.

Their son Maddox, born in Cambodia, was involved with production of the film. Meanwhile, Pitt has increased his role behind the camera, having produced films including 2014's Oscar best picture winner, *12 Years a Slave*, and the upcoming African-American coming-of-age drama *Moonlight*. Pitt will also star two films this fall: *War Machine* and the highly-anticipated WWII spy drama

Allied, with Marion Cotillard (out Nov. 23).

UFC Fight Night 94 results: Michael Johnson knocks out Dustin Poirier in first
HIDALGO, Texas – Michael Johnson ended Dustin Poirier's lightweight comeback and reignited his own with a blistering first-round knockout.

Facing back-to-back losses, Johnson (17-10 MMA, 9-6 UFC) starched Poirier (20-5 MMA, 12-4 UFC) in mid-combination with a right hook and left straight, finishing the job with punches on the mat for a stoppage at the 1:35 mark of the opening frame.

The lightweight bout was the main event of today's UFC Fight Night 94 event at State Farm Arena in Hidalgo, Texas. It aired on FS1 following early prelims on UFC Fight Pass.

Poirier, the No. 13 fighter in the USA TODAY Sports/MMAjunkie MMA lightweight rankings had won four straight UFC bouts since moving up to the lightweight division after a knockout loss to featherweight champ Conor McGregor. A win over No. 12 Johnson offered a chance to move up the rankings and solidify himself as a title contender.

Johnson, meanwhile, had suffered a pair of decision losses, respectively, to Beneil Dariush and Nate Diaz, and he hadn't fought in nine months. The stakes of the fight were evident when the two jawed at the weigh-ins. But early in the action, Johnson's fast hands and kicks were on display. Poirier initially looked to counter and responded with his own leg attacks. With the first meaningful exchange, however, Johnson's loaded up more punches and landed just before they disengaged. A small cut opened up under Poirier's eye.

Then Poirier planted and threw a three-punch combination, and while his hook missed, Johnson's found the mark.

"I say over and over again, I have the fastest hands in this division, I'm the most dangerous guy in this division," Johnson said afterward.

Striding away, Johnson rubbed his fingers together, signaling his desire to get paid. Then he stood over Poirier and cursed him. Cooler heads later prevailed, but Johnson's passion didn't subside.

"I'm going to test anybody," he said. "Give me my next victim. Anybody in this division, I'm coming for that title. I want on that New York card (at UFC 205). Anybody – let's go."

Martin Truex Jr. wins Chase opener at Chicagoland

JOLIET, Ill. — Martin Truex Jr. entered the Chase for the Sprint Cup as one of the favorites to win the championship in November.

In Sunday's playoff opener at Chicagoland Speedway, he showed why.

Truex overcame a flat tire early in the race and rallied back late to win the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles 400 in overtime. Truex lined up fourth on the final restart but was the first car with four fresh tires, which he used to pass Carl Edwards, Kasey Kahne and Ryan Blaney.

"The racing gods don't want us leading too much; they have to make it difficult," Truex said in victory lane. "This feels good. We got more races to win, and we can win some. This is the way we wanted to start it off. It feels awesome."

The victory was the third of the year for Truex, showing his strength on intermediate tracks at an ideal time. He said his mindset after going a lap down was "Don't give up. Just keep digging. There's a long way to go at that point."

The Furniture Row Racing driver, who made NASCAR's championship race last season, now advances to the second round of the playoff with his first career win in a Chase race. In the meantime, Truex won't have to stress about the next two races at New Hampshire Motor Speedway and Dover International Speedway.

Truex also won this year in the Coca-Cola 600 and the Southern 500.

Truex, Johnson escape penalties as NASCAR tweaks 'unfair' rules

NASCAR moved quickly to adjust its penalty structure again on Wednesday, just one week after announcing a new tiered system for post-race penalties.

The system was immediately put to the test Sunday at Chicagoland Speedway, when both race winner Martin Truex Jr. and 12th-place finisher Jimmie Johnson failed to make it through the post-race laser inspection station (LIS).

A typical penalty in that situation — 10 points — would not have hurt Truex but

would have significantly impacted Johnson. That's because a win in the Chase for the Sprint Cup playoff means an automatic berth in the next round — making a points penalty irrelevant.

That struck officials as unfair. So on Wednesday, NASCAR announced it would not penalize Truex or Johnson at all — and completely eliminated the minor penalties for failing inspection.

"This one is on us," NASCAR vice president of competition Scott Miller said. "We missed that. It's something that's not fair, it's hard to understand and we're doing our best to rectify that."

The only remaining penalty for failing the post-race LIS is a mammoth one: If a car is found to be significantly out of tolerance (more than any car has been all year), then NASCAR will view it as an "encumbered" finish and remove the benefits that would come with a victory.

Teams will now be free to go as close to that line as they choose, but at their own peril. If they get into "encumbered" territory, their championship hopes would likely be over.

"We don't want to be talking about post-race penalties," NASCAR executive vice president Steve O'Donnell said. "Our goal is to never penalize anybody and we want to be talking about the action on the track. This is hopefully enough of a deterrent to not have teams go there."

In addition, NASCAR announced it will now run all Chase-eligible cars through post-race inspection — instead of just the top finishers — and would move to limit cars hitting one another on the cool-down lap to help avoid scrutiny in inspection.

NCAA FOOTBALL ROUNDUP: No. 1 Tide hang on

No. 1 Alabama scored two defensive touchdowns and another on special teams to overcome a three-touchdown deficit and beat No. 19 Mississippi 48-43 on Saturday.

Freshman quarterback Jalen Hurts threw for 158 yards and ran for 146 more, but it was unlikely touchdowns from Jonathan Allen, Da'Ron Payne and Eddie Jackson that proved to be the biggest plays for the Crimson Tide (3-0, 1-0 Southeastern Conference).

Ole Miss (1-2, 0-1) looked as if it might be on its way to a third straight win over the Tide late in the second quarter. Instead, it was the Rebels' second collapse in three games.

Ole Miss took a 24-3 lead with 2:47 remaining in the first half after defensive end Marquis Haynes' big hit on Hurts, forcing a fumble that fellow defensive lineman John Youngblood scooped up and ran 44 yards for a touchdown.

But Alabama responded. The Tide needed just three plays and 37 seconds to pull to 24-10. Ole Miss was forced to punt on the next drive and Jackson returned a punt 85 yards for a touchdown, evading several tacklers before bolting down the right sideline for the touchdown.
