party. it was only after the us  
civil war that abolitionists were  
regarded as sane people, not before.  
there is a lesson here for you all.  
people at the abolitionist forum, that  
is, don't worry about what people in

power or media say about you, ask  
yourself if what you're doing is right,  
then roll with it, it's right to oppose  
mass incarceration, it's right to seek to  
abolish the racist death penalty, it's  
right to fight against state repression,  
the right time to do that, is now.
