eople say that this moment of athletic activism started with Colin Kaepernick taking that knee during the national anthem. But as Kaepernick would be the first to acknowledge, it didn't begin with a knee; it started with the Black Lives Matter movement and the pressing need to stand up to racism and police violence.

Just as, today, you can't talk about the civil-rights movement of the 1950s without talking about Jackie Robinson, or of the 1960s without talking about Muhammad Ali, or of the women's-liberation movement without talking about Billie Jean King, in future years you won't be able to talk about this new millennial resistance to racism without talking about Colin Kaepernick.

We should also remember that it's not just what Kaepernick did; it's what he said. When asked why he didn't stand for the anthem, Kaepernick replied, "I am not going to stand up to show pride in a flag for a country.

that oppresses black people and people of color. To me, this is bigger than football, and it would be selfish on my part to look the other way. There are bodies in the street and people getting paid leave and getting away with murder."

As the fiery Hotspur puts it in Shakespeare's Henry IV, Part I: "tell truth, and shame the devil!" Kaepernick told the truth, but the devil doesn't like to be shamed, and the backlash against him has been ferocious. He's been showered with abuse by some of the most dangerous sewer-dwellers in America. And, of course, the NFL's owners—who showered our white-supremacist president with millions of dollars-have collectively denied Kaepernick a living. Their intent, it is obvious now, was to turn him into a ghost story, a warning to other players: Don't be like Colin or you'll pay the ultimate price.

But instead of becoming a ghost story, Kaepernick has become an icon of resistance, and we have all seen this sports season how athletes have used their hyper-exalted, brought-to-you-by-Nike platform to say something about the world.

Still, while much of the coverage has been about professional athletes speaking out, the true resonance has been felt among our youth. High-school athletes across the US, in different sports, have taken a knee to protest the gap between the promises of this country and the lived reality of racism. This has turned the athletic field, which for so long has been either apolitical or a place of uncritical patriotism, into a site of visible dissent.

Now we live in a world where sports, of all things, have given us an arena of tenacious resistance—and, most importantly, hope in very difficult times. What Colin Kaepernick has done is retaught an old lesson to a new generation: that courage is contagious.



### Motel 6's ICE Machine

mployees at Motel 6 locations in Washington State handed immigration and Customs Enforcement officers the personal details of thousands of customers in order to help the federal agency arrest undocumented immigrants, according to a lawsuit filed in January by the state attorney general, Some Motel 6 locations would provide their guest lists to ICE on a "near-daily basis"; ICE officials would circle "Latinosounding names" that the agency would then target, according to a report in The Washington Post. In one location, the motel allegedly supplied names to ICE on 228 occasions over a 225-day period.

The lawsuit follows an investigation by Phoenix New Times last September, which revealed that two Motel 6 locations in Arizona had been alerting ICE to report guests they thought might be undocumented. That article prompted a check for similar occurrences in Washington. According to the attorney general's office, the incidents in Arizona were not isolated: At least six corporate-owned locations in the Evergreen State assisted ICE by furnishing the agency with private personal information. In a statement, Washington Attorney General Bob Ferguson said that . four of those locations released information on more than 9,000 customers. "Motel 6 implied this was a local problem. We have found that is not true," Ferguson said, referring to a statement released by the company claiming that any cooperation with ICE was "implemented at the local level without the knowledge of senior -Miguel Salazar management."

## Going From Bad to Worse

hortly after Hurricane Maria battered Puerto Rico in September, President Trump told reporters that the federal emergency response on the island was "incredible.... People can't believe how successful that has been."

This, of course, was not true. A new report by the humanitarian group Refugees International lambastes federal and Puerto Rican authorities for their "largely uncoordinated and poorly implemented" disaster-relief efforts, which have only been "prolonging the humanitarian emergency on the ground."

And the grim news shows no signs of slowing. After recent investigations suggested that many more people-over 1,000—had died as a result of the hurricane than the government tally of 64, Governor Ricardo Rosselló announced a review of the official death count.

To make matters worse, the new Republican tax bill will treat companies with operations on the island as if they're working in a foreign country. This imposes a 12.5 percent tax on intellectual-property income, which could spur more businesses to flee the island. "We're pretty much just getting ready for 'Maria part 2,'" economist Heidie Calero told CNBC.

Florida is one of a handful of states, mostly in the Deep South, that make it all but impossible for felons to regain their right to vote after they complete their sentence. Currently, an individual has to petition the governor for restoration, and few such petitions are granted. The process is designed to be as byzantine and insurmountable as possible. So, for the vast majority of felons, disenfranchisement is a lifelong condition.

Florida has permanently disenfranchised felons ever since the state's post-Civil War constitution was rewritten to prevent blacks and poor people from voting. In an age of mass incarceration, this law has created a silent epidemic of disenfranchisement. In the years immediately after the 2000 presidential election, the ACLU, the Sentencing Project, and other groups studying the crisis estimated that there were about 750,000 disenfranchised Floridians, the majority of whom had completed their sentence. Now

some 1.5 million Floridians—about 10 percent of the adult citizen population, including 21 percent of African-American men-are voteless, some because they are still serving sentences, but most because of past felony convictions.

If the initiative passes, it will automatically restore voting rights to most felons after their sentences are complete (murderers and sexual offenders are excluded). "This is about creating a more inclusive democracy," argues 50-year-old Desmond Meade, an Orlando resident who founded the Florida Rights Restoration Coalition a few years back. Meade knows the effects of disenfranchisement firsthand: Addicted to drugs, he cycled in and out of jail and prison in the 1990s and early 2000s. In the mid-2000s, after weaning himself off drugs, Meade went to college and eventually got a law degree. Until his rights are restored, however, he can neither vote nor take the Florida bar exam in order to begin working as an attorney.

"It's less about bow a person votes, whether they vote Democrat or Republican," he explains. "It's about redemption, second chances. Once a person has served their time, they should be able to move on with their lives."

If the initiative qualifies for the ballot, it will need 60 percent support in the November election in order for it to be written into the state's constitution.

In a sane society-one, that is, with minimal respect for democratic procedure—such a reform

would win near-universal support. Keeping vast numbers of people in a permanent state of sub-citizenship flies in the face of basic principles of rehabilitation and justice. Unfortunately, Florida has long resisted such reforms, and Republican Governor Rick Scott made a point of reversing his predecessor's efforts to speed up

implications for how we define our democracy, and the cumbersome application process. Similar battles around re-enfranchisement have occurred in Iowa, Virginia, and a few other states in recent years, where Democratic governors have pushed for reforms, and their Republican successors and/or Republican legislators have then attempted, with varying degrees of success, to undo the changes. But this is the first attempt to overturn disenfranchisement statutes through an initiative.

Meade says that people have been coming to help with the campaign in Florida "from Pensacola all the way to Key West, and all points in between. The most exciting thing around this is the grassroots movement."

Hopefully, come November 2018, Florida will end the disgrace of mass disenfranchisement. It is SASHA ABRAMSKY long past time.

In person, Leonardo da Vinci's Salvator

Mundi is haunting, a 500-year-old portrait of

Jesus Christ that seems to radiate from within

"This is the holy grail of Old Master paintings, some people call it the male Mona Lisa," says Francois de Poortere, head of the Old Masters department at Christie's, which will auction off the painting in New York on Nov. 15. "People are deeply taken by this work. You could buy it and just build an entire museum around it."

Salvator Mundi, which means "Savior of the World," is stopping in a few cities around the world for a brief series of public displays that include Hong Kong, London and New York. It is said to be the only one of da Vinci's 20 known paintings (don't forget, this definitive Renaissance man was also an engineer, astronomer and set designer) in private hands. And while the Louvre Museum's Mona Lisa might be more famous, Mundi displays a unique radiance over that yellowing gem because it has been cleaned.

\$1.3M auction bid buys Albert Einstein's theory of happiness

JERUSALEM (AP) — While Albert Einstein's theory of happiness may be relative, it fetched \$1.3 million at a Jerusalem auction on Tuesday.

The Nobel-winning scientist's musings, handwritten on a note, may not be as famous as his groundbreaking theory of relativity, but they still shed light on one of the great modern minds.

Winner's Auctions and Exhibitions said Einstein was traveling in Japan in 1922 when he was told he would be awarded the Nobel Prize in physics. In Tokyo, Einstein scribbled the note in German to a bellboy after he did not have cash to give him a tip.

"A calm and modest life brings more happiness than the pursuit of success WORTHWHILE READING combined with constant restlessness," it reads.

Gal Wiener, CEO of the auction house, said Einstein told the bellboy that because of his fame, the handwritten note "will probably be worth more than a regular tip."

Wiener said bidding began at \$2,000 and quickly escalated, with the bidding war lasting around 25 minutes.

Another note Einstein gave the bellboy, which read "Where there's a will there's a way," was sold for over \$200,000, Wiener said.

He would not identify the buyer or seller of either note.

Einstein was a founder of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and left it his literary estate and personal papers. He declined an invitation to serve as Israel's first president. Einstein died in 1955.

Red light, green light: New cop car can trip traffic signals

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Philadelphia Police Department is getting a new fleet of patrol vehicles that include a feature any motorist stuck at a traffic light would envy. The department announced Monday it will receive 150 new patrol vehicles that come equipped with technology that allows an officer to trip a traffic signal and change it to green when the car's emergency lights are on. The police cars will also come with ballistic shields on the doors and windows. The department will receive 100 of the vehicles by mid-December and get the remaining 50 by March. They will include sedans, SUVs and patrol wagons. The first shipment is heading to a police district in west Philadelphia.

#### Runaway garbage truck hits store named A Beautiful Mess

HENRIETTA, N.Y. (AP) — A runaway garbage truck has slammed into the front of a New York gift shop named A Beautiful Mess, causing extensive damage.

Owner Jeri Flack says he received a call from police on Monday informing her that a garbage truck rolled away from a gas station in Henrietta, traveled across the street and crashed into Flack's retail store.

WHAM-TV reports that gas station workers say the truck driver parked there to use the bathroom and the truck had rolled away by the time he returned.

No one was injured, but the truck's impact caused serious structural damage to the 200year-old brick building.

Flack says she doesn't know if she'll be able to reopen in time for the Christmas shopping season.

#### The most expensive house in the world can be yours for a cool \$410 million

Fed up with your tiny apartment? Looking to impress your friends? Got about \$410 million to spare? Then the most expensive home ever to go on sale could be yours.

Yes, the Villa Les Cèdres, an 18,000-squarefoot, 14-bedroom mega-mansion in the south of France is now on the market. It even has royal connections, having been owned in the STORIES 0/27/2017
early 20th century by King Leopold II of
Belgium, who apparently thought his palaces
at home weren't quite enough.

Part of the reason for its high price is its location in super-exclusive Saint-Jean-Cap-Ferrat, a resort town perched on a picturesque peninsula between Nice and Monaco. Also adding to the cachet is the fact that it is situated on 35 manicured acres in a community where pricey homes tend to be crowded onto small lots.

The Villa Les Cèdres library contains about 3,000 books on flora and naturalism, including a 17th-century botanical tome said to be worth several hundred thousand dollars, according to Bloomberg Businessweek, which toured the decadent domicile Unfortunately, you will have to pay extra for that, as well as for the carpets, paintings and furniture contained in the home.

But you won't pay extra for notable neighbors, who include famed composer Andrew Lloyd Webber and Microsoft cofounder Paul Allen.

The house is currently owned by Italian beverage giant Campari, which inherited the property when it bought Produits Marnier Lapostolle, the maker of Grand Marnier, an orange-flavored liqueur sometimes used in making margaritas. The Marnier-Lapostolle family bought the home in 1924, Bloomberg reported.

Will it fetch its asking price? With Russian oligarchs, who have until recently been on a buying spree in the area, currently in short supply, *Bloomberg* says the assessed value may be aspirational.

However, if the price does not drop dramatically, it will become the most expensive residential sale in history, according to CNN, trumping the Clampett estate in Bel Air, Calif., which listed in August for \$350 million.

#### Canadian man fined for singing '90s dance tune in car

MONTREAL (AP) — A Canadian man's decision to belt out a 1990s dance hit while inside his car has landed him a \$149 ticket for being too loud in public.

But Taoufik Moalla said Monday he'll fight the ticket and denies his singing was as deafening as authorities claim.

Pavel Buchnevich scored twice and added an assist, rookie Boo Nieves had three assists to lead the New York Rangers beat winless Arizona for just their third victory of the season.

The Rangers shook up their line combinations and played with a traditional lineup consisting of 12 forwards and six defensemen for the first time in a week. It helped them beat Arizona for the eighth straight time, dating back to March 24, 2014.

Steven Stamkos and Nikita Kucherov became the seventh set of teammates in NHL history to start the season with point streaks of at least 11 games, leading surging Tampa Bay past Detroit.

Kucherov got his 12th goal in the first period, and setup Stamkos' power-play goal from the low left circle that put Tampa Bay (9-1-1) up 2-1 at 6:22 of the third.

Frans Nielsen had two goals and Jimmy Howard stopped 35 shots for the Red Wings (4-6-1), who have lost six straight (0-5-1). Detroit has lost nine straight games against Tampa Bay.

#### Bruins 2, Sharks 1

Danton Heinen scored both goals and Anton Khudobin made 36 saves to lift Boston past San Jose.

Joe Thornton scored for the Sharks, who went 1 for 6 on the power play. They had a chance in the final two minutes after Brandon Carlo went off for slashing and got three shots while creating havoc in front of Khudobin but couldn't capitalize.

#### Panthers 7, Ducks 3

Radim Vrbata recorded his seventh career hat trick to lift Florida past Anaheim.

Evegenii Dadanov scored two goals and Vincent Trocheck and Aleksander Barkov each had a goal and two assists for the Panthers while Owen Tippett, the youngest player in the NHL at 18, scored his first career goal. James Reimer made 31 saves. Thirteen players recorded points for the Panthers.

#### Hurricanes 6, Maple Leafs 3

Josh Jooris scored twice, Teuvo Teravainen had a three-point night and Carolina beat Toronto.

Victor Rask scored midway through the second period to give Carolina the lead and Brock McGinn and Jooris added insurance goals in the third. Elias Lindholm and Teravainen also scored for the Hurricanes, who ended a two-game losing skid.

#### Senators 5, Flyers 4

Jean-Gabriel Pageau had a goal and two assists, Erik Karlsson added two assists and Ottawa held off Philadelphia.

The Flyers appeared to score midway through the third period but after a coach's challenge the goal was reversed due to goaltender interference.

Jakub Voracek and Travis Konecny had the other goals for Philadelphia, while Michal Neuvirth stopped 22 shots.

#### Wild 6, Islanders 4

Eric Staal had a goal and assist, and Luke Kunin and Zack Mitchell each scored their first NHL goals to lead Minnesota.

Staal scored short-handed to cap a three-goal first-period burst for Minnesota in 7:26. He later assisted on Kunin's tally as the rookie became the first player in Wild history to score short-handed for his first NHL goal, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

#### Oilers 5, Stars 4

Matt Benning scored the tiebreaking goal with 2:27 remaining and Ryan Nugent-Hopkins had two goals as Edmonton finally found its offensive touch in a win over Dallas.

Connor McDavid and Patrick Maroon also scored for the Oilers, who had scored an NHL-low 15 goals through the first eight games. Cam Talbot stopped 28 shots. Jamie Benn struck twice for the Stars, and Alexander Radulov and Esa Lindell also scored for Dallas in its second straight loss. Ben Bishop finished with 30 saves.

Dodgers 3, Astros 1: Dodgers lead series, 1-

The game: This is exactly what makes the Fall Classic classic.

Justin Turner broke up a pitching duel between a pair of Cy Young Award winning lefties with a two-run homer in the bottom of the sixth to lift the Dodgers to victory in the opener of the 113th World Series.

"I didn't know if it was going to be a home run or not. I knew I back spun it pretty good. I knew I hit it really high," Turner said. With the temperature at first pitch a World Series record 103 degrees, home runs figured to be an important weapon for both offenses. "When it's that hot here, the ball does travel a lot better," he said. "If it's 10 degrees cooler, that's probably a routine fly ball in left field." All four runs in the game came as a result of

#### Astros persevere, win wild one in 11th inning to stun Dodgers and even World Series

Astros 7, Dodgers 6 (11 inn.): Series tied, 1-

The game: Now, this World Series has some drama.

What looked like a sure-fire two games-tonone lead for the Dodgers is all even thanks to some late-inning heroics from the top of the Astros order.

In one of the craziest games in World Series

history, George Springer's two-run blast in the top of the 11th was the final blow in a slugfest that included eight home runs and blown saves by both teams' closers.

"I've been part of some pretty exciting games, but with all that this one entailed to be in the World Series and to be down a game, the roller coaster of emotion ..." marveled Astros starter Justin Verlander, who allowed three runs in six innings, but was long gone by the time the game was decided, "This is an instant classic, and to be able to be part of it is pretty special."

Houston trailed 3-1 entering the eighth inning with a dominant Dodger bullpen that had pitched 28 consecutive scoreless innings in the postseason poised to close things out.

However, Carlos Correa's RBI single and Marwin Gonzalez's solo homer off Kenley Jansen pulled Houston even

With Josh Fields taking over for Jansen in the 10th, Jose Altuve and Correa hit back-toback home runs in the top of the 10th inning to put the Astros in front. Correa even punctuated his blast with an elite-level bat flip.
