Coalition says no to extremists

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JORDAN — Representatives Coalition Friday launched their petition drive for an initiative to combat tactics of extremists near the site of the Freemen standoff to show that mainstream Montanans will speak out against extremist activity.

"When one Montanan is threatened by extremists, then all Montanans are threatened," said Evan Barrett, co-chair of the coalition.

"Mainstream Montana cannot remain silent in the face of extremist activity. We have to stand together and let the extremists and the hate groups know that their tactics are not welcome in our state."

Hearing that message were James "Bo" Gritz, Jack McLamb and Randy Weaver, who are prominent figures among the far right and Patriot movement. Many human rights organizations consider the men to be linked to hate or extremist groups they say advocate or condone a racist, conspiracy-laced and violence-prone message of intolerance in America.
