NEWSPAPER ARTICLES ABOUT MY CASE

The press was all over the criminal case:

The heading in the La Crosse Tribune reads:

“La Crosse man convicted of attempted homicide, burglary”. That was Friday August 18, 2000. See (Exhibit 1-A).

Then on Tuesday October 3, 2000, the Tribune wrote a headline:
“Man gets 60 years in attempted homicide”

(See Exhibit 1-B).

On exhibit 1-C, the newspaper ran a front page Preview-Teaser
“COMING SUNDAY” on Saturday December 30, 2000,

“REAL TIME: For Childeric Maxy, a 60 year prison term for attempted homicide and burglary might just have been a **life sentence. In the past the 35 year-old Maxy could have hoped for parole after 15 years.** But under the state’s truth-in-sentencing law he’ll have to reach **his 95th birthday** to have **another chance at life outside.** On Sunday, a look at what judges and attorneys think of the law a year after it took effect.

The next Sunday December 31, 2000, the Tribune released a full front-page story about my case: **“Cold Hard truth-doing the crime means doing the time”** by Joel Hannahs.

“When he handed Childeric Maxy 60 years in prison, judge Michael Mulroy knew that under the state’s new truth-in-sentencing law, he was giving Maxy what amounted to **a life sentence...** Mulroy bluntly told Maxy Oct. 2 that he was sending him away **‘until you die’**, with a sentence crafted to ‘take away the guesswork out of this’ Mulroy had used the same phrase in 1998, commenting on the new law after it was signed by **Gov. Tommy Thompson...**”

As you could see how the La Crosse media have sensationalized my criminal case, so I think I am a poster child for this commutation by the governor.
